The Single-Unit Crown Solution: Procedural Predictability & Restoration Longevity

The single-unit crown procedure has a significant impact on the profitability of a restorative dental practice. By addressing the critical steps in the procedure, clinicians can deliver greater efficiency, more predictable clinical outcomes, enhanced auxiliary staff usage, and overall patient satisfaction. To achieve a strong foundation and long term success, clinicians need a solution that simplifies the steps within the procedure of preparation, provisionalization, impression-making, and cementation. The importance of fabricating a provisional and its impact within the procedure will be highlighted, as will troubleshooting of common problems when recording a final impression. In addition, definitive cement selection will be reviewed as it is critical to match the correct cement choice to the desired crown material to obtain optimum results for the procedure. Utilizing a case based approach, the steps of the single unit crown procedure will be analyzed to help provide a complete solution for overall restoration success, reliability, and longevity. Be Aware of Wear: A Systematic Approach to Diagnosing, Treatment Planning, and Restoring the Worn Dentition

In today's society tooth wear is more prevalent than ever and it is therefore incumbent upon the entire dental team to be well versed in recognizing the clinical signs of wear while understanding the importance of prevention when possible and the restorative options when necessary. This lecture will illustrate the different types of tooth wear with clinical examples, and demonstrate a systematic approach to diagnosis and treatment.

Learning Objectives:

- Recognize the clinical signs of intrinsic and extrinsic erosion.
- Office protocols to help patients prevent and/or treat acid erosion.
- Recognize the clinical signs of horizontal and vertical wear patterns.
- Designing an occlusal scheme that fits the grinding patterns of the patient.
- Bite opening vs. crown lengthening vs. orthodontic intrusion to gain space for restorations.
- The importance of an interdisciplinary team in treating wear cases.
- A systematic approach in the treatment of simple to complex wear cases.

Green Dentistry: THC and teeth? What you need to know about cannabis and oral health.

This course is for doctors, hygienists, assistants, and front office staff. Marijuana is the most commonly used recreational drug in the United States. 23 states currently have some form of legalized marijuana; eight states have legalized it for recreational use. It is estimated that over 10% of the US population uses it at least once a month. This course will be an unbiased and evidence based presentation of marijuana and its role in dentistry. An introduction to the usage of marijuana in the general public population will first be discussed. Second, will be about the pharmacology of marijuana. In the third part of this course you will learn how the use of marijuana by your patients affects their dental care.

At the conclusion of the course the participants will:

- Understand the pharmacology and pharmacokinetics of marijuana
- Understand how marijuana usage by patients effects their oral health; specific focus on oral pathology, caries risk, and periodontal disease
- Understand interactions of THC with commonly used prescribed medications and be familiar with medical emergencies related to THC

Sexual Harassment Training

Training on how to prevent workplace harassment is now mandatory for almost all California employers (five or more employees).

In the past, only California employers with 50 or more employees were required to provide sexual harassment prevention training – and only to supervisors. Effective 1/1/19, SB1343 requires all California employers with **five or more employees** to provide:

This course is a 2-hour instructor-led sessions where employees will engage in discussions on all forms of sexual harassment (verbal, visual, and physical). Other types of prohibited harassment, discrimination, retaliation and abusive conduct will also be covered in an interactive format. Supervisor's will learn how to recognize problems and about their responsibility in the prevention of sexual harassment, discrimination, retaliation and abusive conduct. Topics include reporting, investigating and resolving complaints, parameters of confidentiality, and practical tips on how to stay out of trouble and keep your workplace harassment-free.

What's a Dentist to Do?: Diagnosis, Treatment Options, and Rehabilitation of Difficult and Unusual Cases

Sometimes the restorative dentist encounters clinical situations that are out of the ordinary and can often be difficult to treatment plan.

This lecture will examine several such cases in order to explore treatment options and develop treatment plans. Treatment results will be demonstrated along with helpful clinical tips on: material selection, how to determine incisal edge position, intra-oral composite mock-ups, opening bites, taking CR records, avoiding biologic width violations, fabricating and evaluating provisional restorations, multiple unit adhesive cementation, bonding to porcelain in the mouth, and fine tuning occlusal adjustments.

He graduated from UAB School of Dentistry in 2011 and obtained his PhD in Biomedical Engineering in 2012. He has served as an investigator on over 50 research grants and has written over 150 published journal articles, textbook chapters, and abstracts. He lectures nationally and internationally on the topics of dental ceramics and direct restorative materials. He works as general dentist in the UAB Faculty Practice.
